PLUN has evolved from an adaptation of straight forward processes of design that result into simple products displaying innate qualities of their type, material and finishes. To this approach there is also a conscious address to, when required, Indian-ness - owing to the contexts we have grown up in.

the manner in which we interact with design around us, both planned and unplanned, formal and informal, consciously and unknowingly; especially in a country like ours where systems exist beyond the obvious and what meets the eye is often the layered chaos, these observations in a furniture and product ecology become backgrounds while understanding how we desire our products and ways in which we behave with them.

'places and traces'

is our attempt at introducing the practice not just through the design backgrounds of its people but through the contexts that have affected us, the very essence of living in Mumbai.



'growing up in Mumbai, I have unconsciously absorbed design in multiple forms, for example the grating of the metal floors in a local train, the distance between its two seats, the graffiti on my tours to the fish market, the customized interiors of taxis, the beachfronts and bhelpuri walas who informally mark these vast spaces, and much more. These have remained with me over the time as I have transitioned to being a designer. I continue to remain fascinated by these chance encounters that the city offers, nowadays more so while I navigate the Mustafa bazaar to source wood or to Crawford market, from where on each round I come back amazed.

Even though these realizations are not often the subjects of my designs, my process is informed by these conscious and chance learnings that the city has offered me.'

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Trikona **Coffee table**

The coffee table was the first piece designed under this collection following the inspiration from the shape of a Boomerang which reflects in ts form. A simple arrangement of two arches, mirrored horizontally, result into a stable arrangement over which a glass top sits supported at the three connecting points.







Trikona Side table

Continuing the exploration of form from the coffee table, an assembly of 3 legs gives rise to the form of the side table. Made in two sizes, the table is monolith in the choice of its material. Forming interesting geometries on all sides, the dynamic nature of the core theme continues in this piece as well.











Trikona **Arm Chair**

The Trikona chair is the third product added to the Collection 1. Like the other pieces in the same range, this chair was developed around the idea of a stable triangular form, however it manifests into a joinery in this piece. - a junction where all the elements of the chair come together. Some further refined details were added to its elements while in the process of its making.











Trikona **Trays**

The need for an accessory as a part of this collection rose as we finished the development of the coffee table. As a complimenting feature along with the table the set of trays are simply derived by converting a triangular form softer.




